Excerpt from The HIV Movement in Crisis: Understanding the Impact of the U.S. Funding Loss on the HIV Response (March 2025)

(<u>Editor's Note</u>: This document has been prepared by the *Stephen Lewis Foundation* and appears on the SLF website at stephenlewisorganization.org. under *Publications – Learning Reports*. This citation is from page 11 entitled *Orphans and Vulnerable Children*. GRL Sandi refers to the study's survey in her March 2025 *GRL Updates*.)

A backbone of the HIV response for decades has been supporting children who have lost one or both parents to AIDS-related causes and other children made vulnerable by HIV. The loss of U.S. funding has halted services, nutrition programs, school fees payment, caregiver support programs, etc. for hundreds of thousands of orphaned and vulnerable children. An SLF partner shared with us how significantly the funding loss affects orphaned and vulnerable children in their community: "We have 46,335 unsupported orphaned and vulnerable children from the decision, some of them are living with HIV and others are survivors of gender-based violence, including sexual violence and exploitation."

GRL Updates - March 2025

The foreign aid crisis continues to dominate the conversation this month. As we move into the spring fundraising season, I hope you will take every opportunity to seek donations to the Emergency Fund.

USAID Crisis Update

Since the initial announcement of a funding freeze of *USAID*, some clarification has been provided, for example, exemptions for *"lifesaving medications."* However, the reality is that without the staff to deliver and administer medications, including *ARVs*, people are not getting the help they need. In addition to *HIV* and *AIDS*, efforts to eliminate tuberculosis and malaria have been seriously impacted.

Following the initial review, the *US* government announced on March 10th that 83% of *USAID's* programs would be cancelled, involving approximately 5,200 contracts and 90% of the staff. The freeze in HIV relief programs, including *PEPFAR*, is estimated to jeopardize treatment access for 20 million people, including 500,000 children.

In spite of challenges in the courts as to the constitutionality of this action, nothing has changed.

Emergency Fund

SLF partner organizations have been seriously impacted by the freezing of *USAID* funds, whether they are direct recipients or not. The *SLF* staff surveyed 98 partner organizations (72 responded) between February 14 and February 24, 2025, to better understand the impacts of the funding loss on their communities. The intent was to identify areas where the emergency funds were most needed.

The survey complements what was learned through email correspondence and ongoing conversations with partners since the *US* decisions were announced in late January. *SLF* partners who responded to the survey had more than \$44 million *USD* of *US* funding frozen or terminated. For 18 *SLF* partners, each have lost \$100,000 *USD* or more. Copies of the full report have been sent to group leaders in the Ottawa-Gatineau Region.

SLF has created a poster and QR codes that groups can use for raising emergency funds as well as a press release and FAQs. Copies have been shared with group leaders but if you need more, please contact Sandi or Sarah and we will send you the electronic files.

National Fundraising Webinar

Staff at the *SLF* are still working on plans for a national online event with the intention of informing donors of the current foreign aid situation and raising money for the emergency fund. They are approaching keynote speakers and considering approaching other, like-minded foundations. We will keep you apprised of any decisions as they take place.

Regional Meeting

Following the regional meeting on February 11th, groups reported back on a preferred timeframe for the next *Grannyfest* and whether or not they would be able to contribute to a market, such as 613 Flea. We also received feedback on a charity benefit fundraising event with *Ottawa Little Theatre* which is looking very positive. We will be meeting again in early April to plan a way forward on these initiatives.

Stride to Turn the Tide

June is traditionally *Stride* month but the concept can be carried over to any time of the year. The Campaign call on March 20th was dedicated to helping groups set up donation pages. I would hope that the Ottawa-Gatineau region would make an effort to contribute to this annual event. It doesn't have to be a major undertaking. Just a short walk on a single day would raise awareness and funds. Consider making it a multi-generational event and involve the grandchildren.
